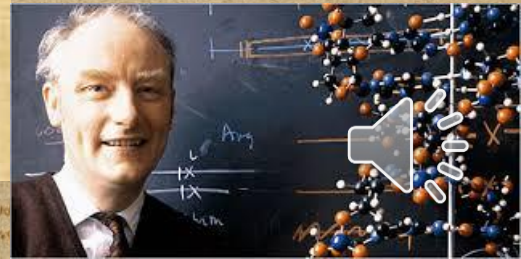
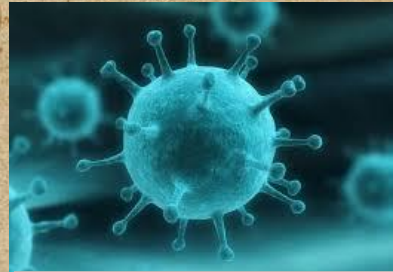
Medicine through Time from 1250 to the present day.

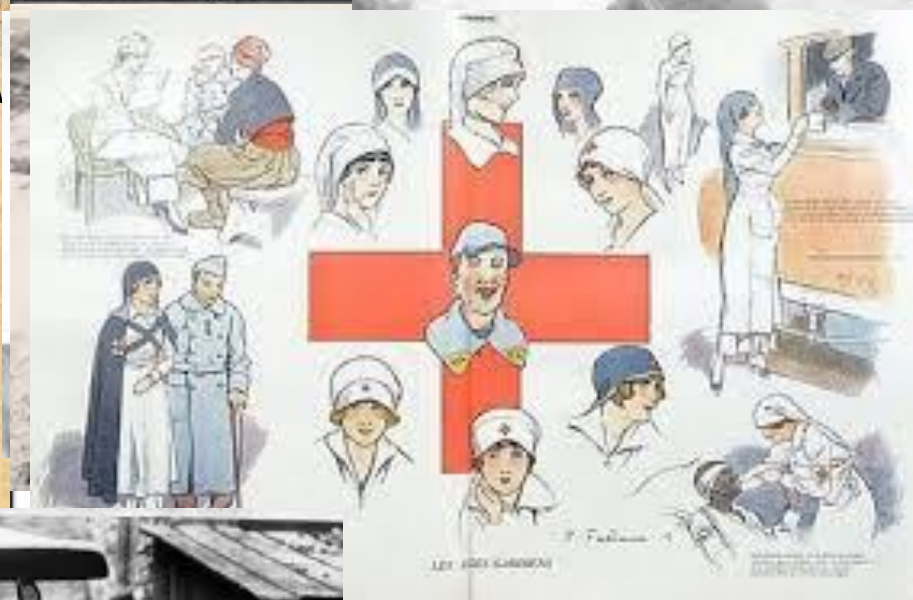

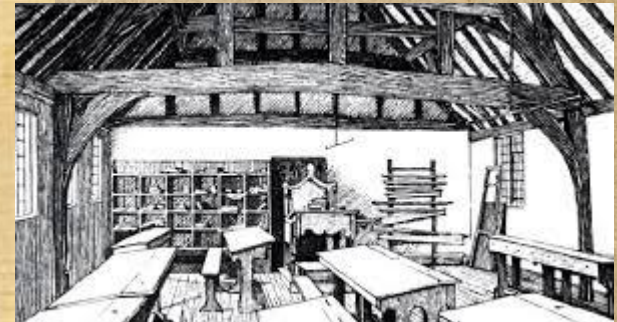

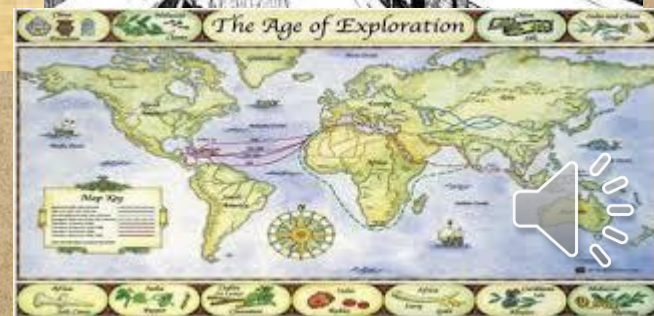


## Elizabethan England 1558-1588

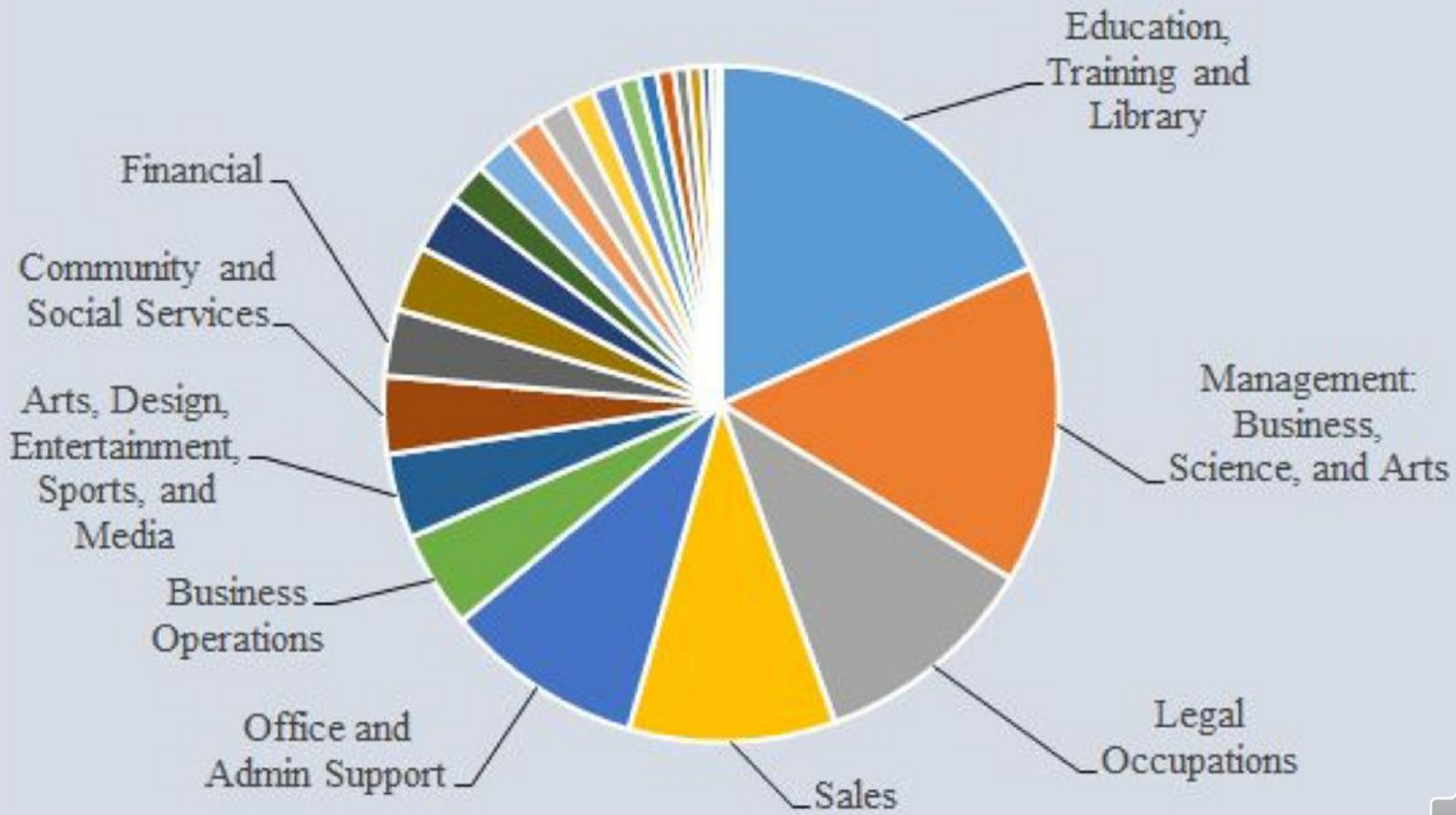
